Two big amateur events will take place in Los Angeles just weeks apart. The Amateur returns to Southern California for the first time since 1976, as Riviera Country Club hosts its third USGA championship following the 1948 U.S. Open (won by Ben Hogan) and 1998 Senior Open (won by Hale Irwin). Three and a bit weeks later, George Thomas's terrific North Course at Los Angeles Country Club (recently renovated by Gil Hanse, and slated to

hold the 2023 Open) stages its first Walker Cup, with Great Britain & Ireland hoping to retain the trophy it won so convincingly at Royal Lytham and St Annes two years ago.

## **B** COURSE OPENINGS

Course debuts may have slowed to a trickle in recent years, but those that are opening are virtually all significant, meaningful, important, and lasting—not vapid, flavorless tracks that weave through homogenous housing. Among the most notable: Streamsong Black in Florida (Gil Hanse), Sand Valley in Wisconsin (Bill Coore/Ben Crenshaw, and David McLay Kidd), Silvies Valley Ranch in eastern Oregon (Dan Hisson), Stoatin Brae in southwest Michigan (the sixth course at Gull Lake View Resort, Renaissance Golf), and Big Cedar Lodge in Missouri (Gary Player) all fit the
